# **Minutes of the Meeting for EAA Chapter 172**

# Winter Soup Party

February 8, 2014

The weather was cool and rainy earlier in the day but by 11:00 AM there were blue skies with temperatures in the low 60s and a light wind -- perfect flying weather, according to Billy Couch who came in his Cessna 185. Three planes were



on the field. Before the meeting, 34 members, their families, and visitors enjoyed sampling delicious soups prepared by five club members. The soups were vegetable soup, 15 Bean Soup, chicken soup with dumplings, Green Chili stew, and lima bean soup. The Aerospouses set out the side dishes. Frances Weiss had been in earlier in the



week to start setting up the tables with a Valentine's Day motif. At 12:30 PM club president Sid Brown gave the invocation and everyone ate. The short business meeting started around 1:05 PM. Sid thanked those who brought their favorite soups allowing others to enjoy them. Among those preparing soup were Cindy & Joe Britt, Cathy & Sid Brown, Sheila Connell, Don Murphy, and Frances & George Weiss. No soup poll was taken since all the soups were great! President Brown welcomed visitor Bryson Jimenez, Jean Hildebrant's great-grandson.

*Old Business*: Don Bush moved to accept the minutes for the last meeting. Al Nodorft seconded the motion and the club members approved the motion unanimously. Sid Brown said that his son, Ben, only has his third oral and written exams remaining before finishing his aircraft A&P education and training.

New Business: Commercial pilot Vice-president Nandi Shetty and airline first officer Ed Christian discussed the new FAA policy that commercial pilots wishing to become airline first officers now have to obtain an ATP certificate and to have logged 1500 hours experience. They also have to be "type rated" for the aircraft they fly in airline service—i.e., receive special training and testing on operation of that specific aircraft type. Because of the low pay for pilots especially for the regional airlines (sometimes as little as \$20,000 a year for first officers, about what a McDonald's server earns), this may decrease the number of available airline pilots in the United States because of the increased requirements and costs to obtain the first officer rating.

After the meeting some members moved the low-functioning clubhouse refrigerator out and, for a replacement, brought in the working refrigerator from the food trailer into the clubhouse.

There was a short board meeting before the meal and regular meeting. The officers discussed the financial report that was in the February newsletter. They determined that we could spend an increased amount for youth flight training with the Al Patton Scholarship if the club had more funds. So it was decided that future <u>printed</u> newsletters, starting with the <u>April Pea Patch Post</u>, will have two, not five, double-sided pages. There will be the main page – the Prez Sez along with the Name That Plane and the phone numbers & addresses of the club officers and contact information for the Club Division Leaders. The printed newsletter will also have the Minutes and photos for the last meeting or event. Then it will have the information about the Name That Plane aircraft as well as the South Carolina Breakfast Club locations for the next five or six weeks. There will be no other pages besides the mailing address page. This is expected to save the club \$600 - \$700 annually which can be more appropriately spent on other club activities.
